Wireless Hotspot launches new Business Pride scheme

Lansdown Industrial Estate was the first business area in Cheltenham to experience the benefits of the new Business Pride scheme.

In March, AVM Waste Ltd proposed the installation of a wireless hotspot scheme at the estate, which is home to nearly forty businesses, on both short and long term leases. AVM recognised that traders - especially those on three month leases - would be unable to set up their own broadband account due to time constraints.

Cheltenham Borough Council, working with Parklife, agreed that it is very difficult for SMEs to connect to the internet on such a timescale, and through Business Pride, match funded the landlord of the industrial estate and AVM's proposal for a sum of almost £800. SMEs as a result, are now able to trade via the internet.

"This was a significant

step in being able to offer businesses the ability to communicate and trade with the outside world", said Steve Clark, the managing director of AVM.

"We were delighted to support Cheltenham Business Pride from the offset, and we are now delighted that the scheme was able to support us with this project."

"Giving businesses in Lansdown access to the internet was one of our top priorities," said Keith Rog of Parklife.

"Business Pride has given local businesses the confidence to actively seek change where it is needed and make a difference. Businesses on this industrial estate can all now benefit from having broadband - especially the ones who are only on short-term lease agreements but still have an active role to play within the development of Cheltenham's local economy." •
