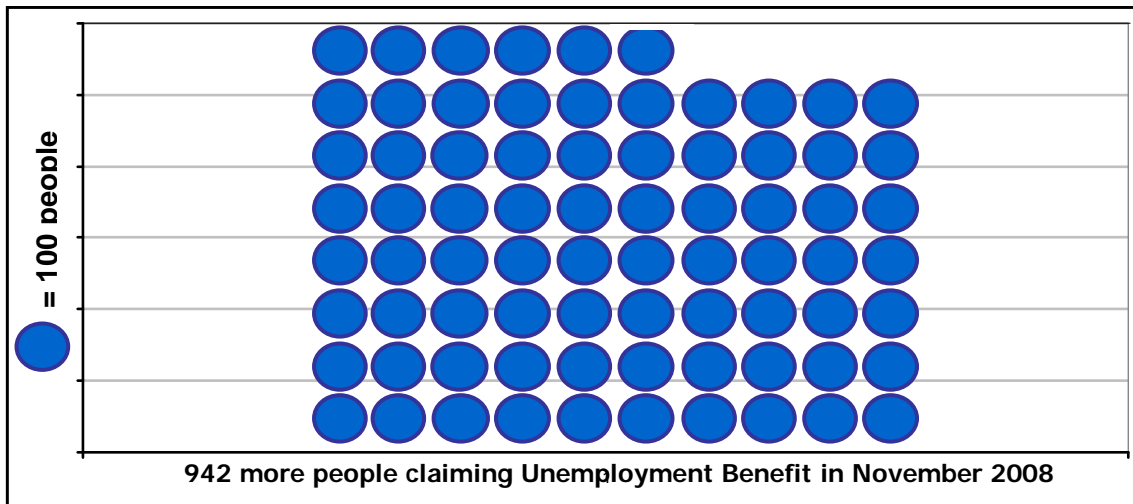

**Claimants in Gloucestershire = 7,581 people**

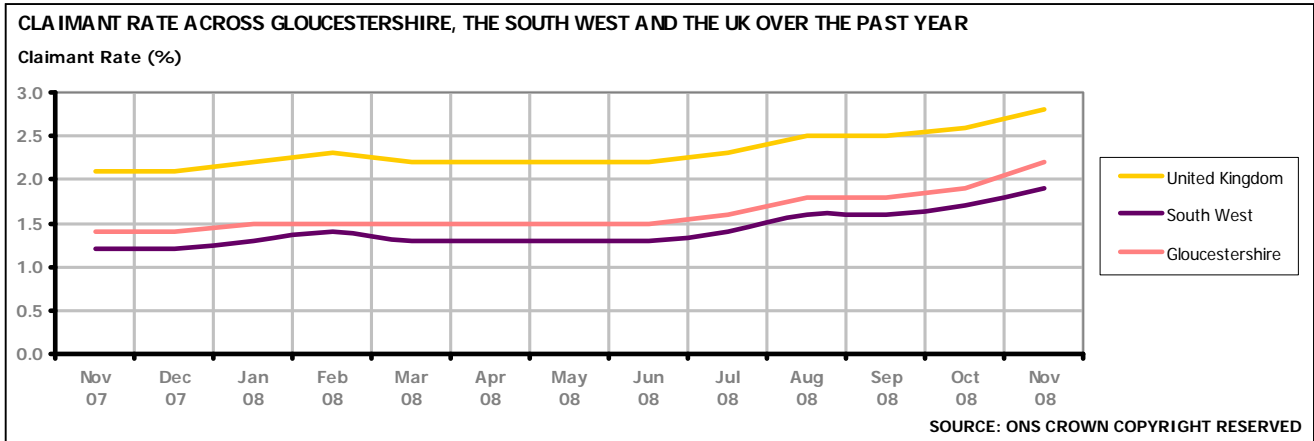

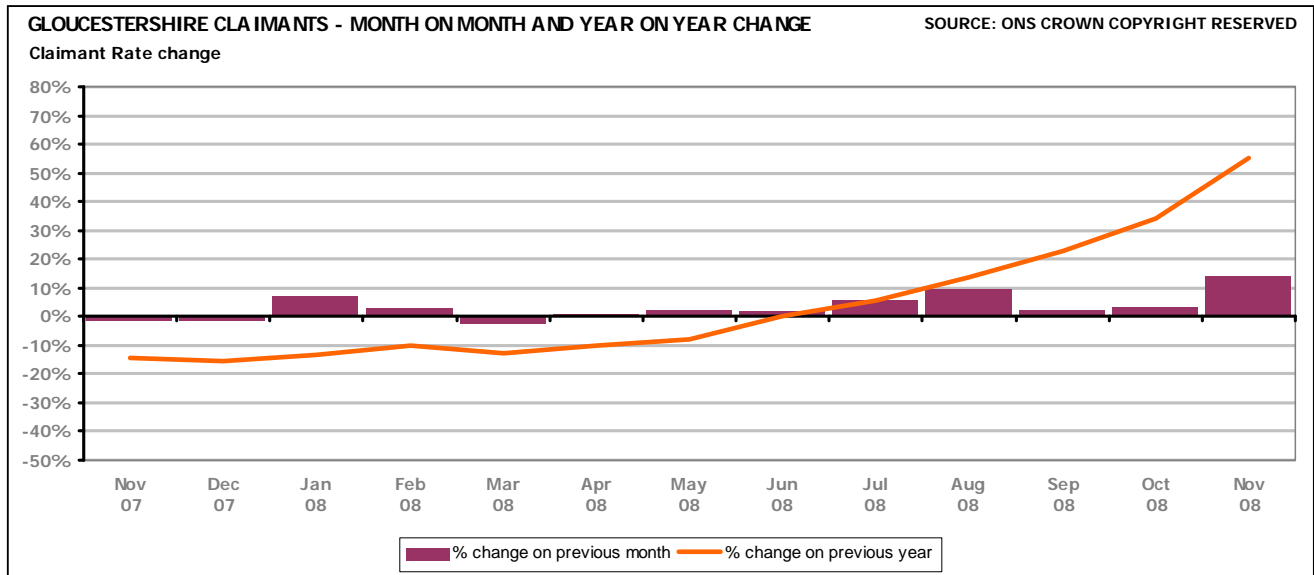

## SUMMARY

The claimant rate in Gloucestershire was 2.2% in November 2008. This was an increase of 0.3% on the October 2008 figure. This is the eighth consecutive monthly increase. Both the UK and the South West rates increased by 0.2% between October 2008 and November 2008. Gloucestershire's rate remains slightly above the South West average of 1.9%, but over half a per cent lower than the UK average of 2.8%.



The claimant count in Gloucestershire in November 2008 rose by 942 people. The amount of people claiming in November 2008 was therefore 15% higher than the number in October 2008. The increase was 14% across the South West, and 9% for the UK.



The claimant count in Gloucestershire has been increasing for eight consecutive months, and stood 55% higher in November 2008 than at the same point the previous year.

- In **Cheltenham Borough** the claimant count has increased each month since April 2008. Cheltenham has the highest number of consecutive monthly claimant count increases of all the districts of Gloucestershire. Cheltenham also has the second highest claimant rate in Gloucestershire at 2.6%
- In **Cotswold District** the claimant count in November 2008 was the highest for two years and has been increasing since July 2008. In addition, the claimant count in November 2008 was over 71% higher than it was in November 2007. Despite this increase, the Cotswolds have the lowest claimant rate in Gloucestershire at 1.2%
- In the **Forest of Dean District** the claimant count in November 2008 was the highest since April 2007 and has been increasing since May 2008. Pillowell ward continued to be above the district average for claimants for the second consecutive month. The Forest of Dean has the third highest claimant rate in Gloucestershire at 2.4%
- In **Gloucester City** the claimant count increased by 192 people between October 2008 and November 2008. The largest increases were found in Moreland, Barton and Tredworth, and Barnwood wards.
- In **Stroud District** the claimant count increased by 42 people between October 2008 and November 2008. This was the second consecutive monthly increase in claimant count.
- **Tewkesbury Borough** had the overall highest percentage increase in claimants of any district between October 2008 and November 2008. The increase in claimants reversed the trend between September 2008 and October 2008, where claimants fell. Despite the increase, Tewkesbury still has the second lowest claimant rate in Gloucestershire at 1.8%

**The 16-18 NEET population** has decreased from 4.6% at the end of October 2008 to 3.9% at the end of November 2008.

**Some 35% of the joiners** had managed to return to EET (education, employment and training) at the time of the analysis showing the effectiveness of early intervention.

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Part 1: UK, South West and Gloucestershire Indicators

Claimant Rate<sup>1</sup>

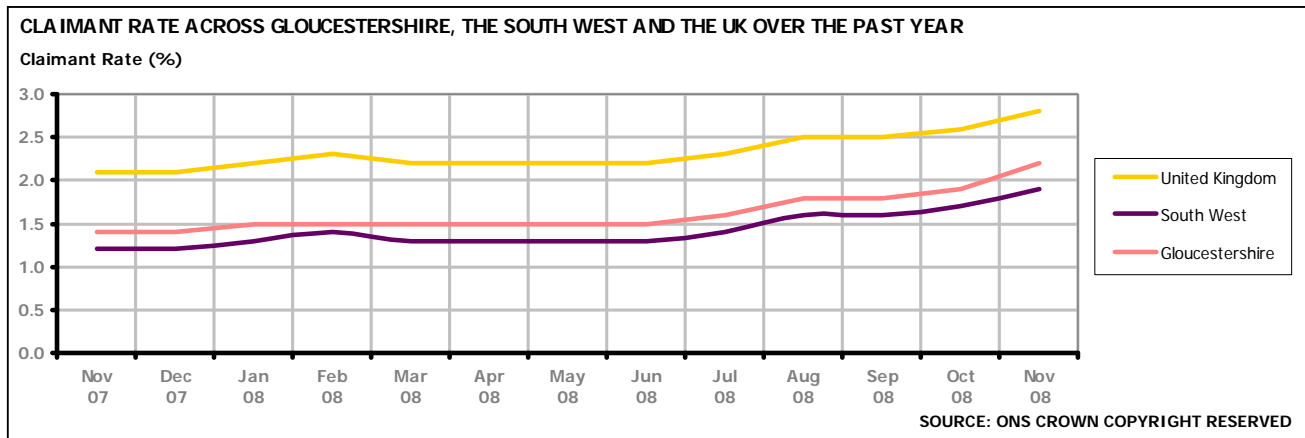


Figure 1 shows the claimant rate for Gloucestershire at 2.2% in November 2008. The rate has remained slightly higher than the South West average over the past year, but persistently lower by approximately 0.5% against the UK average during the same period. November 2008 represented a 0.3% increase on October 2008.

Table 1 shows that in November 2008, the number of claimants in Gloucestershire was 14.2% higher than the number in October 2008. This is comparable with the South West increase, but nearly twice that of the UK increase.

The average growth in claimants in Gloucestershire for the six months to October 2008 was 5.7%. Although 1.7% higher than that of the UK average, Gloucestershire has been overtaken by the average for the South West region, where growth in claimants over this period was 0.7% higher.

<sup>1</sup> The Claimant Rate is the amount of claimants as a percentage of the working age population for the claimant group.

<sup>2</sup> JSA Claimant Count records the number of people claiming Job Seeker's Allowance (JSA) and National Insurance credits at Job Centre Plus Offices. This is not an official measure of unemployment, but is the only indicative statistical measure available for areas smaller than Local Authorities.

<sup>3</sup> The difference between total claimants in November 2008 and October 2008 expressed as a percentage increase or decrease.

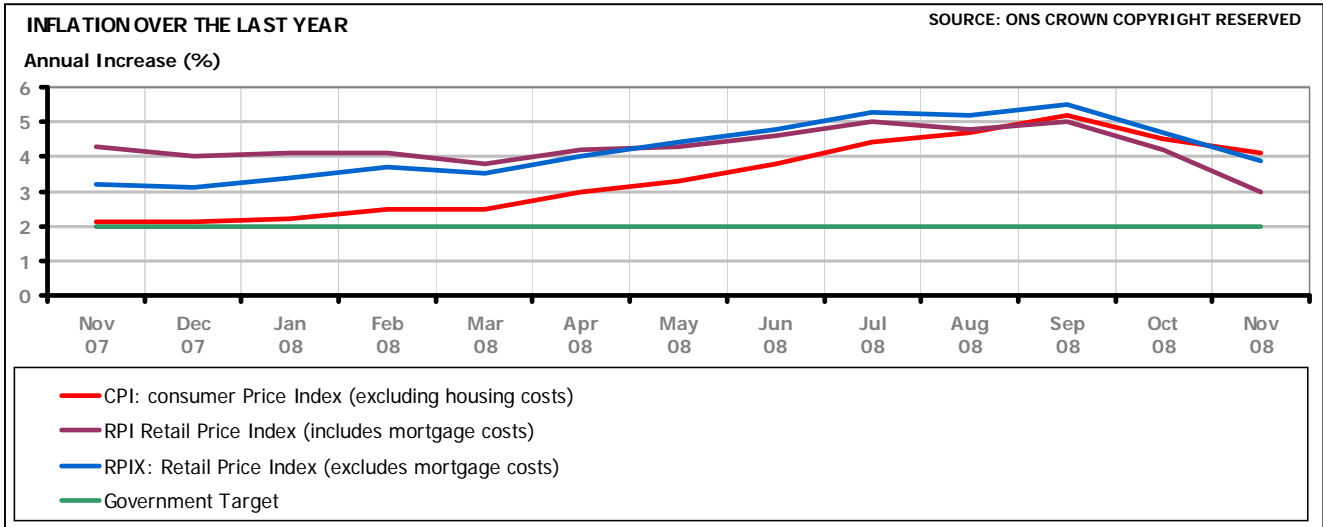


Figure 2 shows the national level of inflation since November 2007. The Consumer Prices Index (CPI), which the Government use for their target measure, was 4.1 per cent in November 2008, down from 4.5 per cent in October 2008. The Retail Prices Index (RPI) was 3.0 per cent in November 2008, down from 4.2 per cent in September 2008. The Retail Prices Index excluding mortgage interest payments (RPIX) was 3.9 per cent in November 2008, down from 5.7 per cent in October 2008.

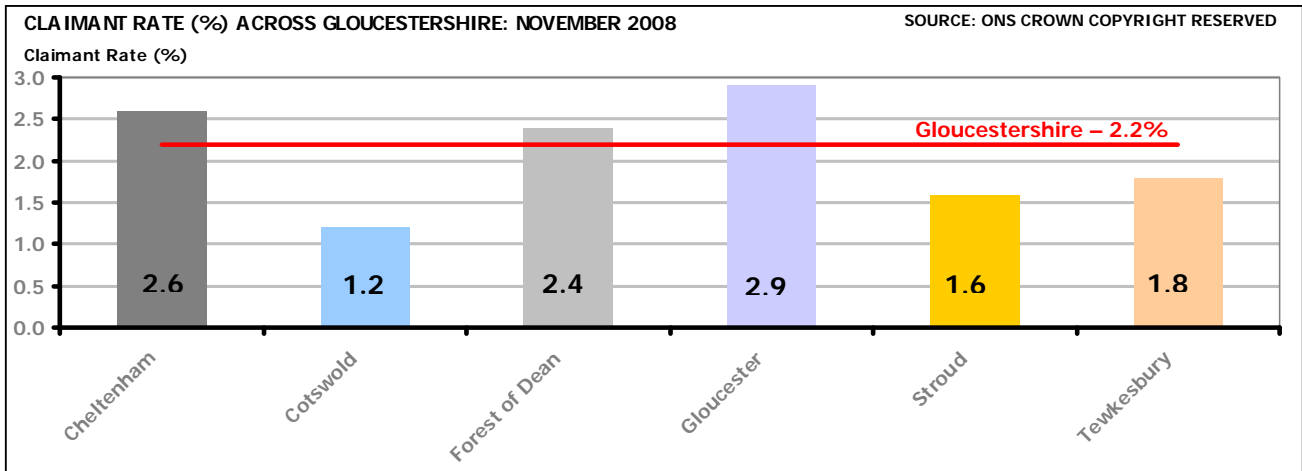

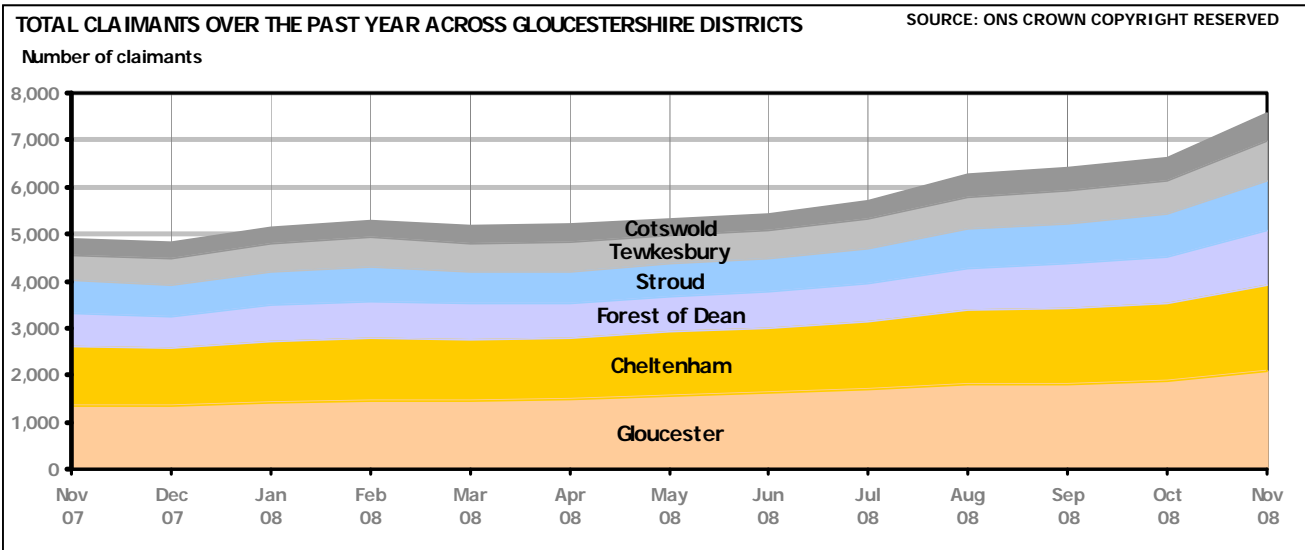


Figure 4 shows the overall claimant count for Gloucestershire over the past year. It demonstrates the gap that is widening across all the districts as the UK economy moves towards recession. The widest gaps are not surprisingly reflected in the urban areas of Cheltenham and Gloucester.

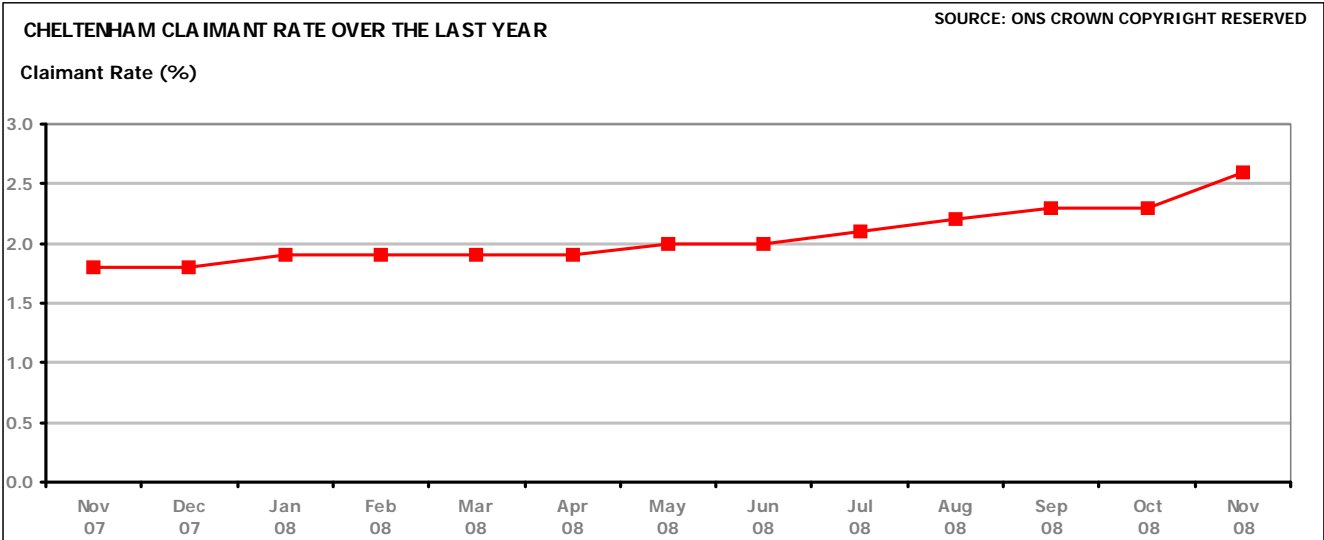


Figure 5 shows the claimant rate in Cheltenham was at its highest rate for over a year at 2.6%. The rate has been climbing for eight consecutive months.

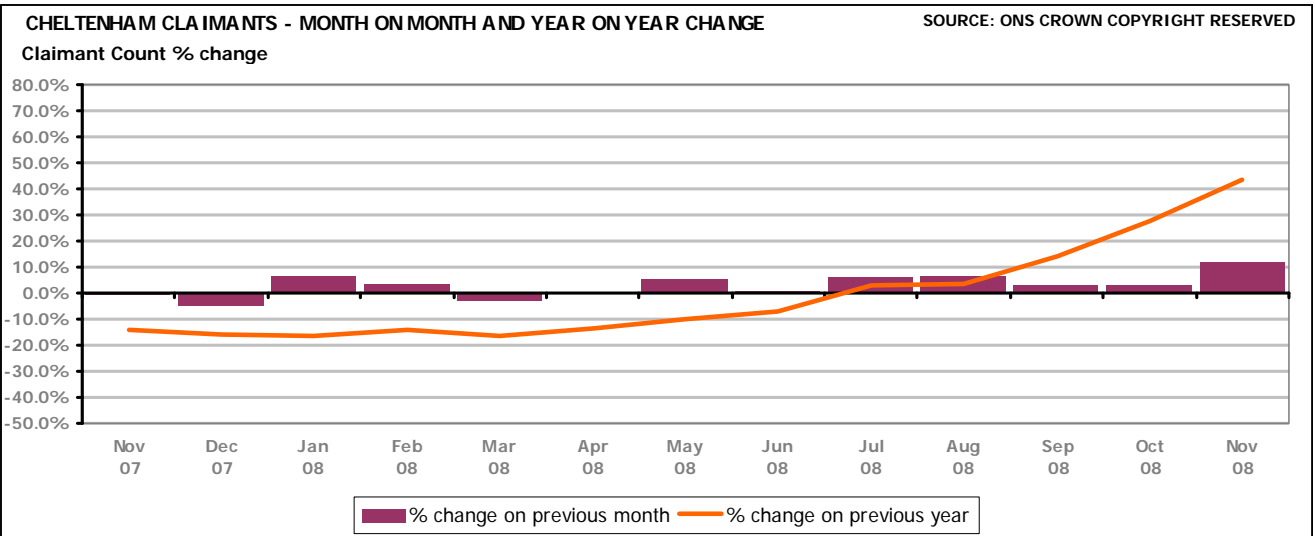


Figure 8 shows the claimant count increasing each month since April 2008. In addition, claimant counts have increased every month on the same month the previous year since July 2008.

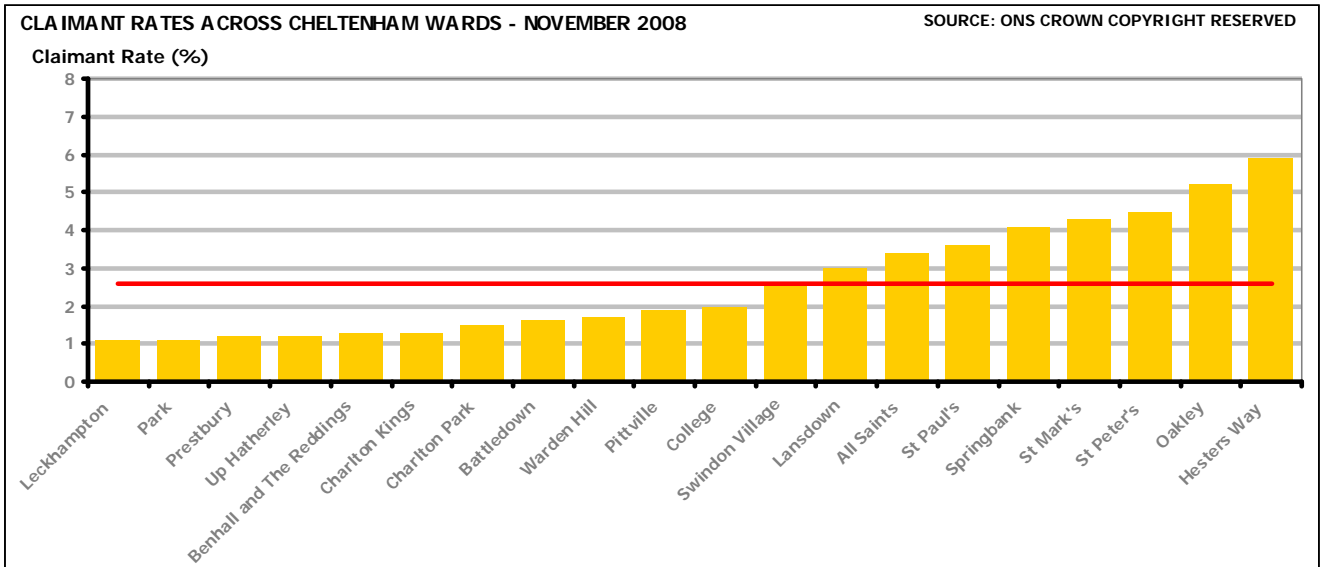


Figure 7 shows the claimant rates for Cheltenham Borough wards. The red line represents the average claimant rate across the Borough, with eight wards above the average.

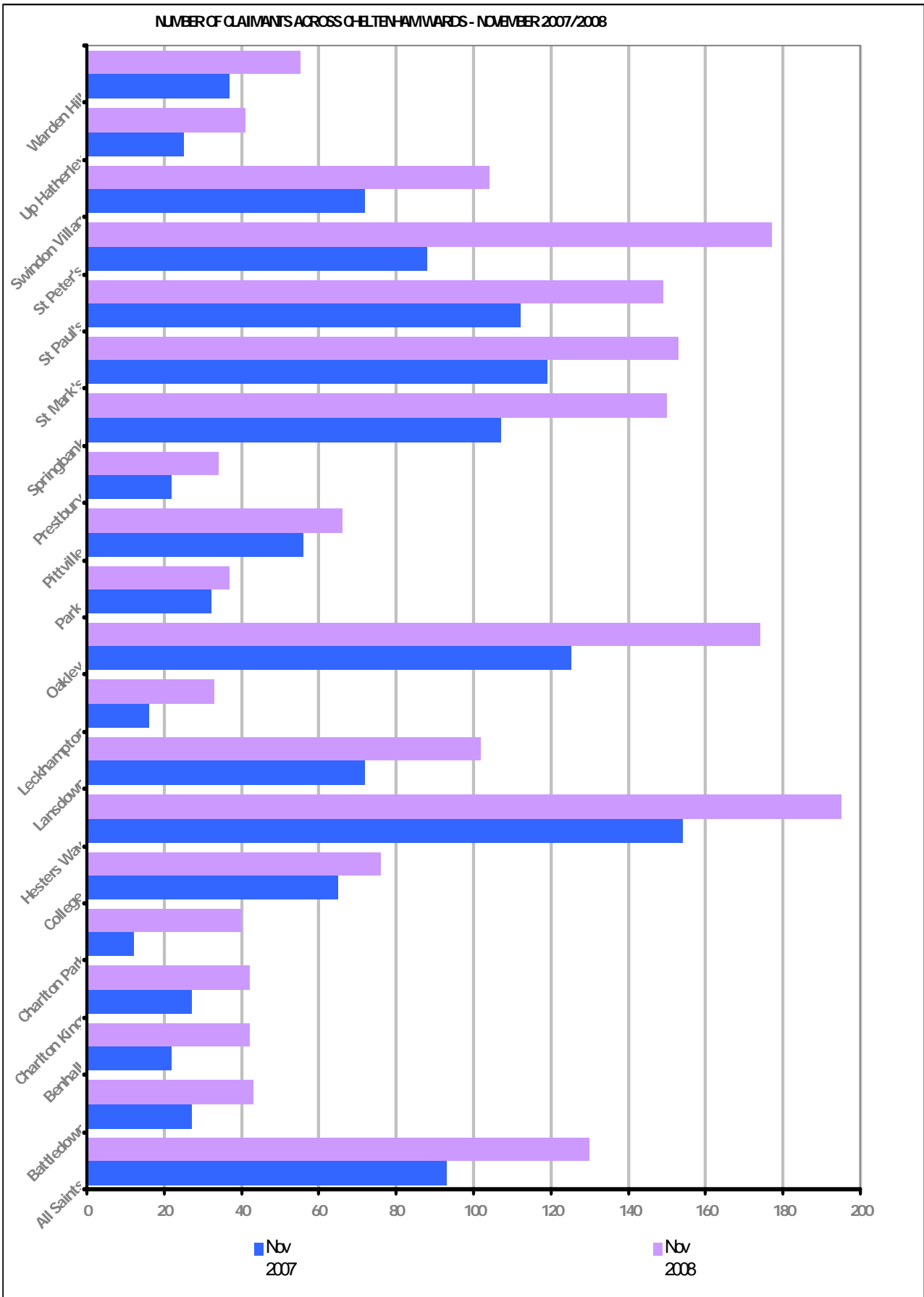

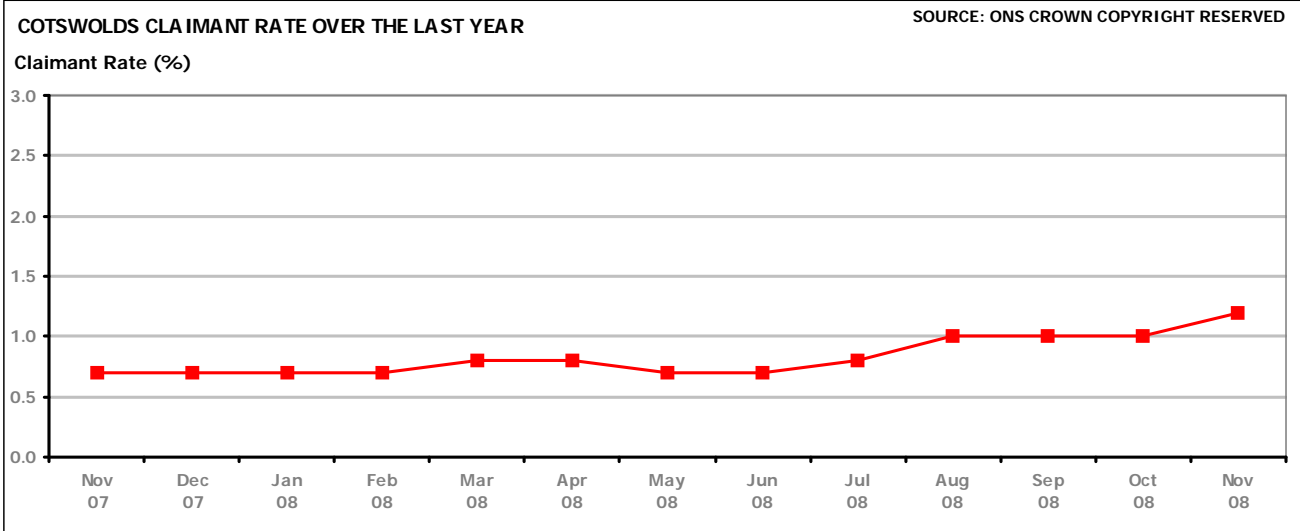


Figure 10 shows the claimant rate in the Cotswolds was at its highest rate for over a year at 1.2%. The rate has been increasing since June 2008.

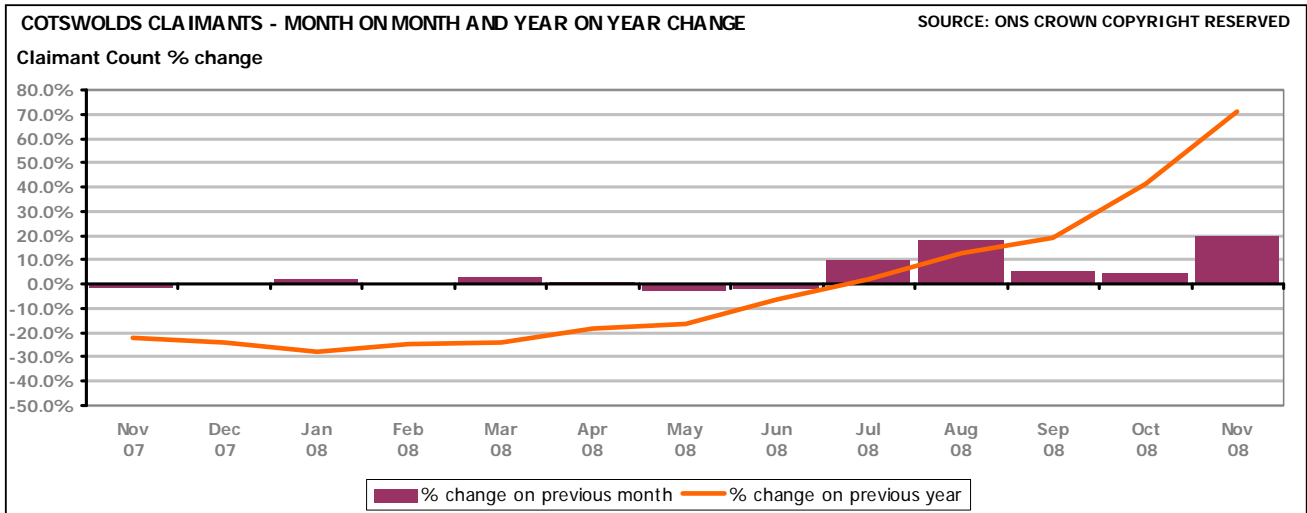

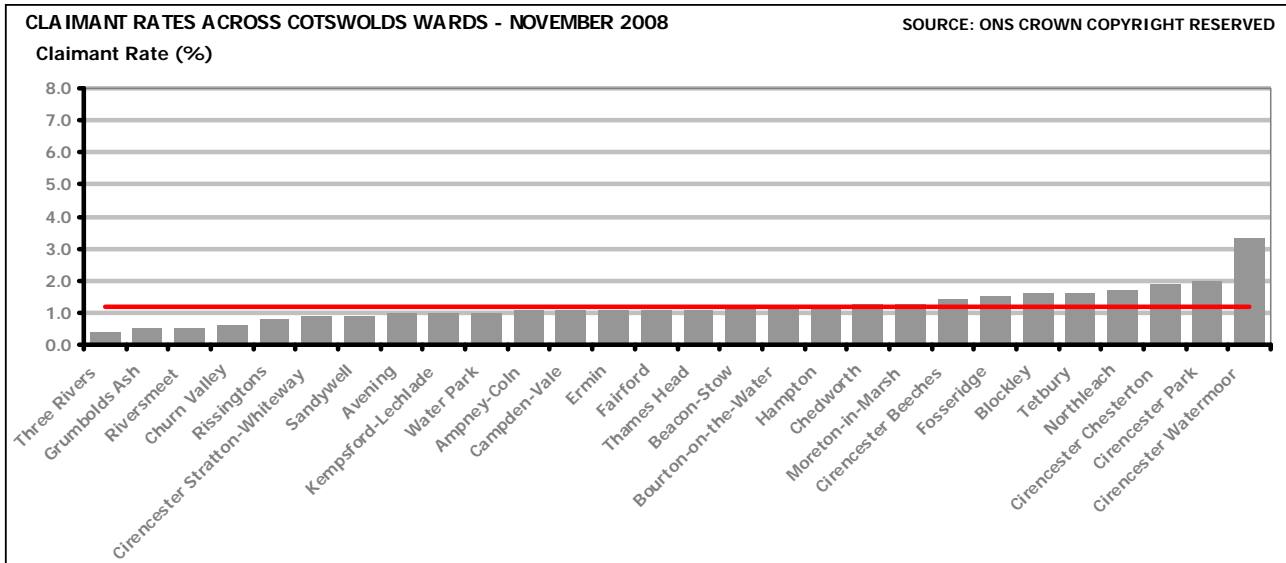


Figure 12 shows the claimant rate for the wards in Cotswold District. The red line represents the average claimant rate across the District. Ten wards are above the Cotswold District average.

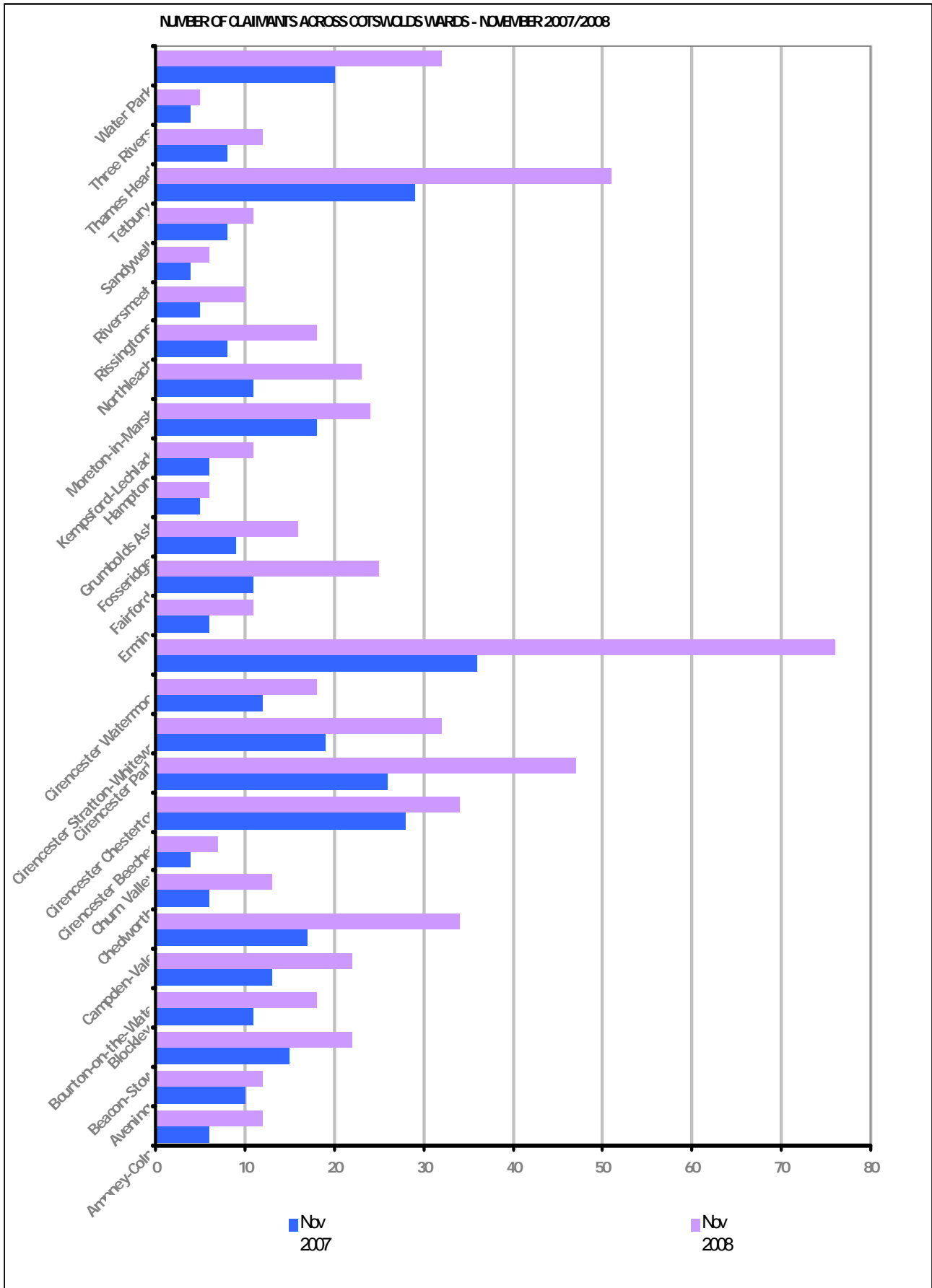

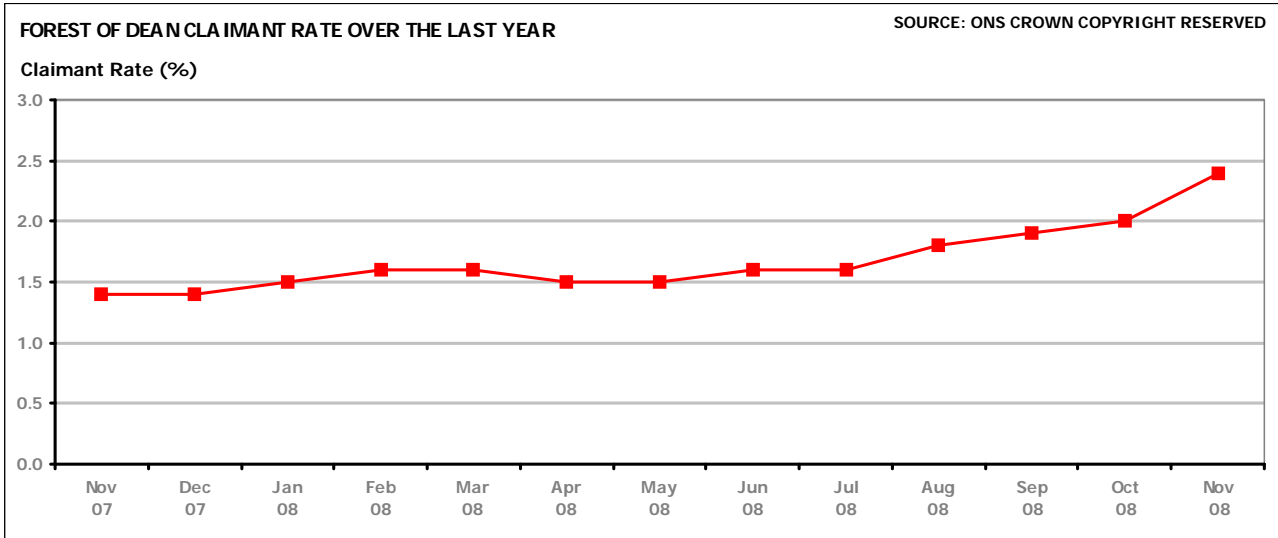


Figure 14 shows the claimant rate in the Forest of Dean was at the highest point for over a year at 2.4%.

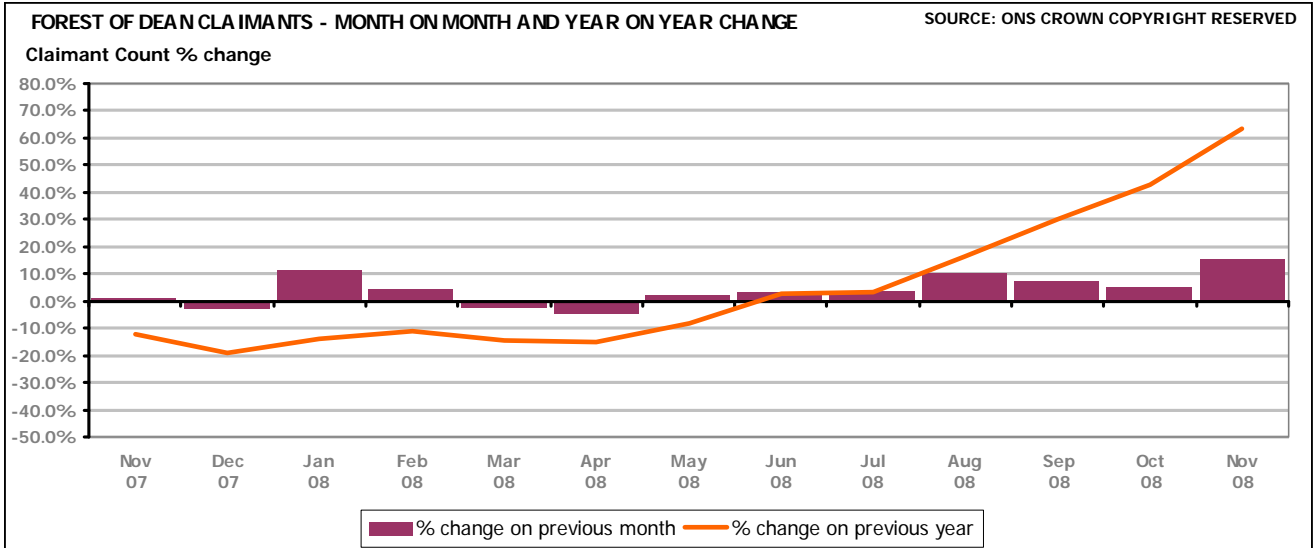

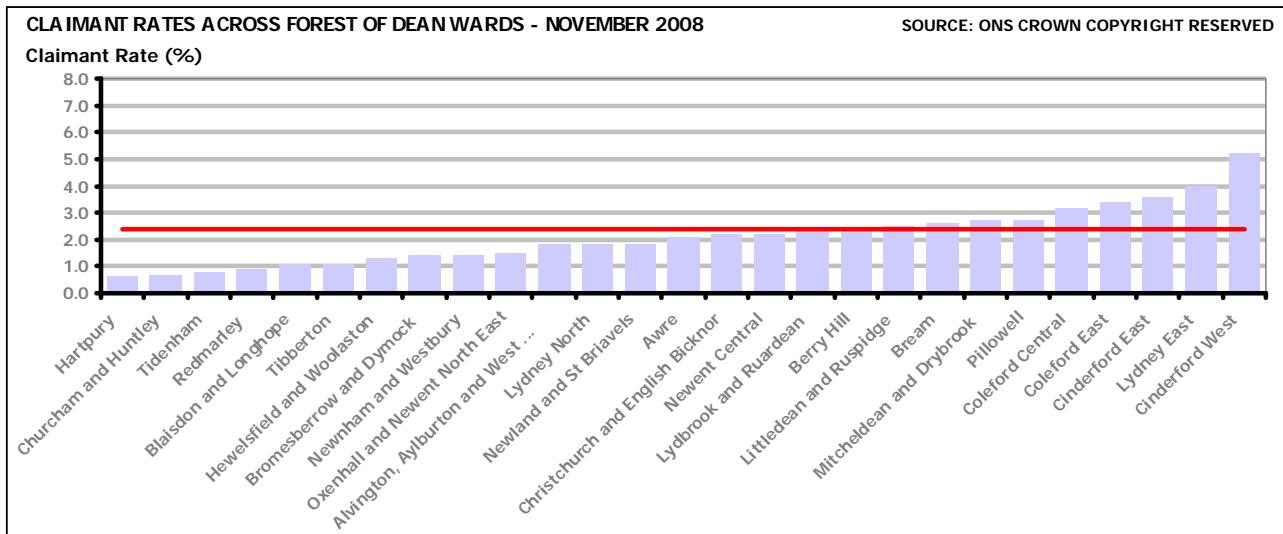


Figure 16 shows the claimant rate for Forest of Dean District wards. The red line represents the average claimant rate across the District, and ten wards are above this average

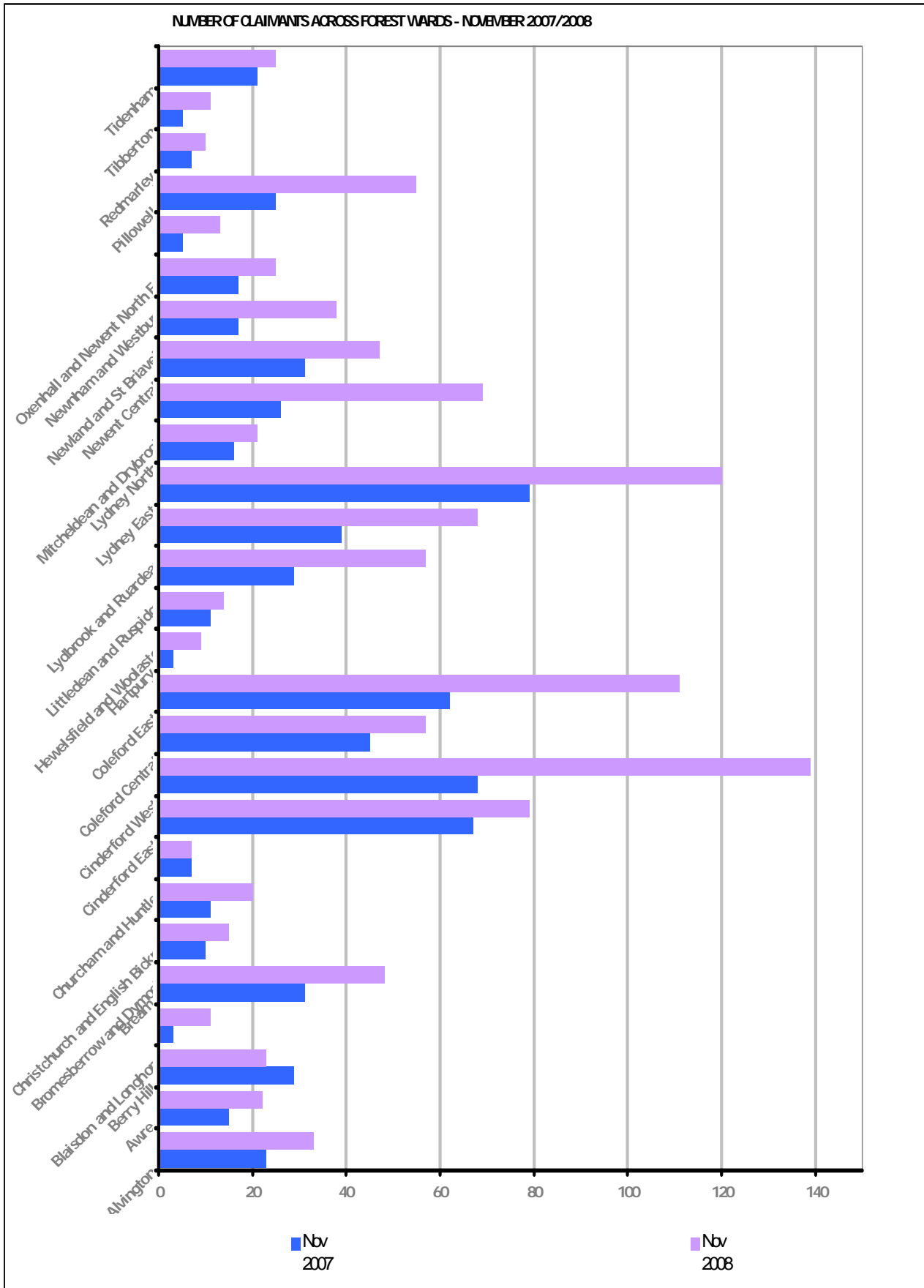

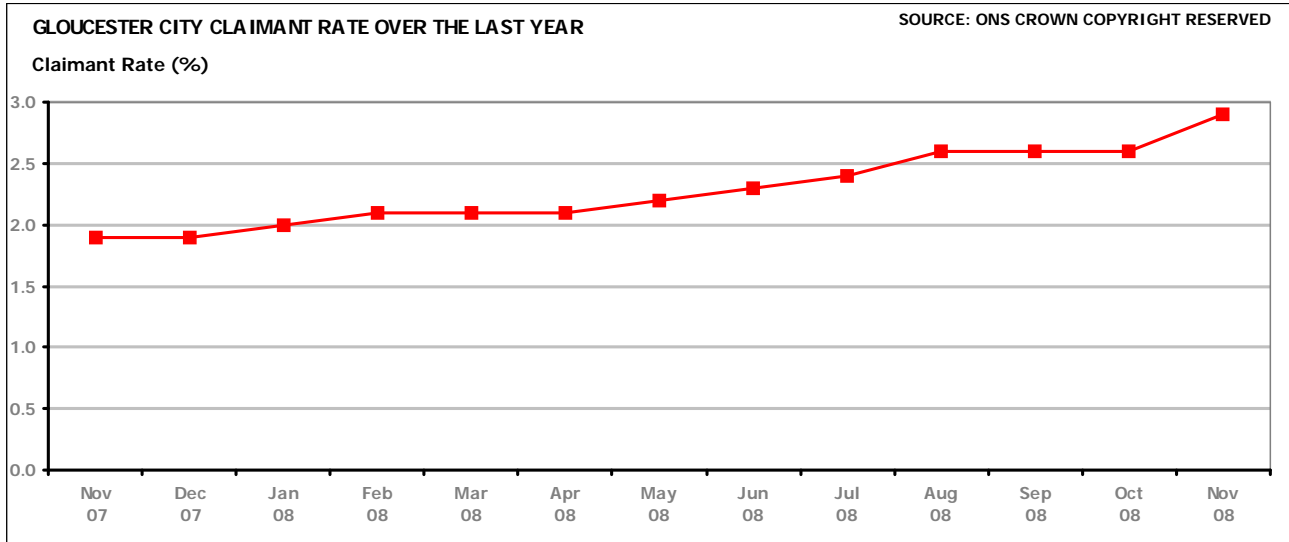
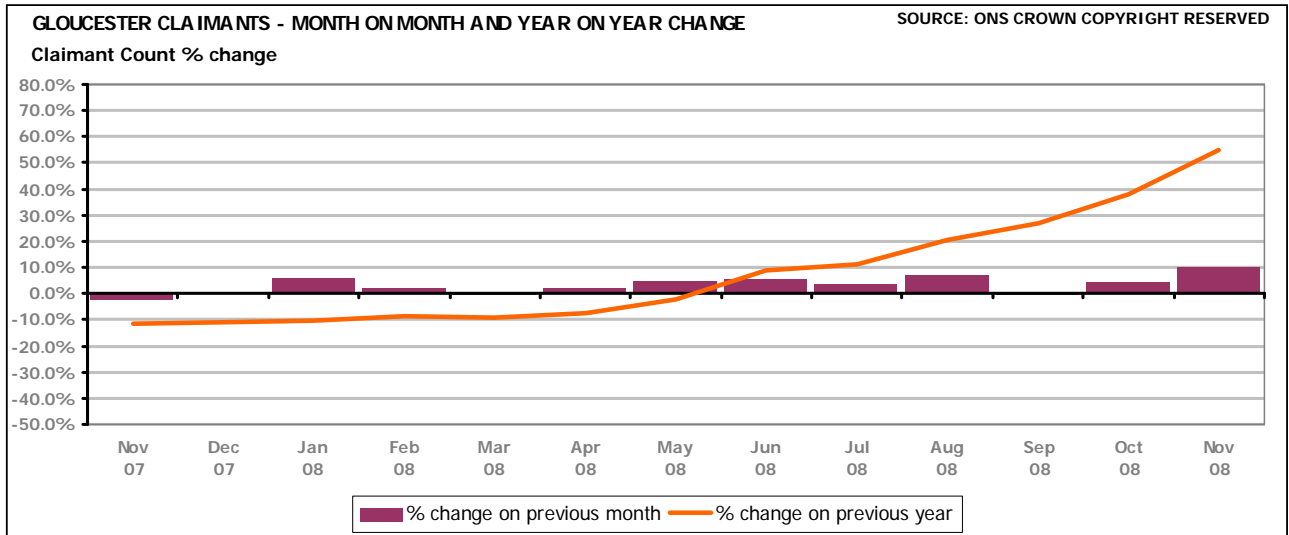


Figure 18 shows the claimant rate for Gloucester City was at the highest point for over a year at 2.9%.

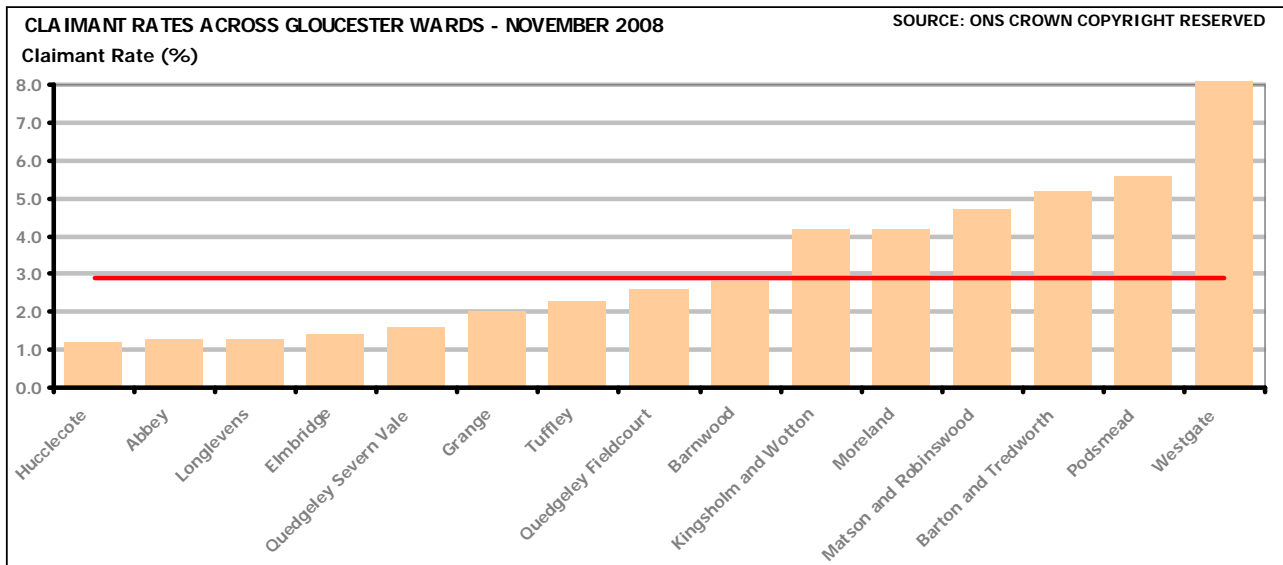


Figure 20 shows the claimant rate for Gloucester City wards. The red line represents the average claimant rate across the City and six of the wards are above the City average.

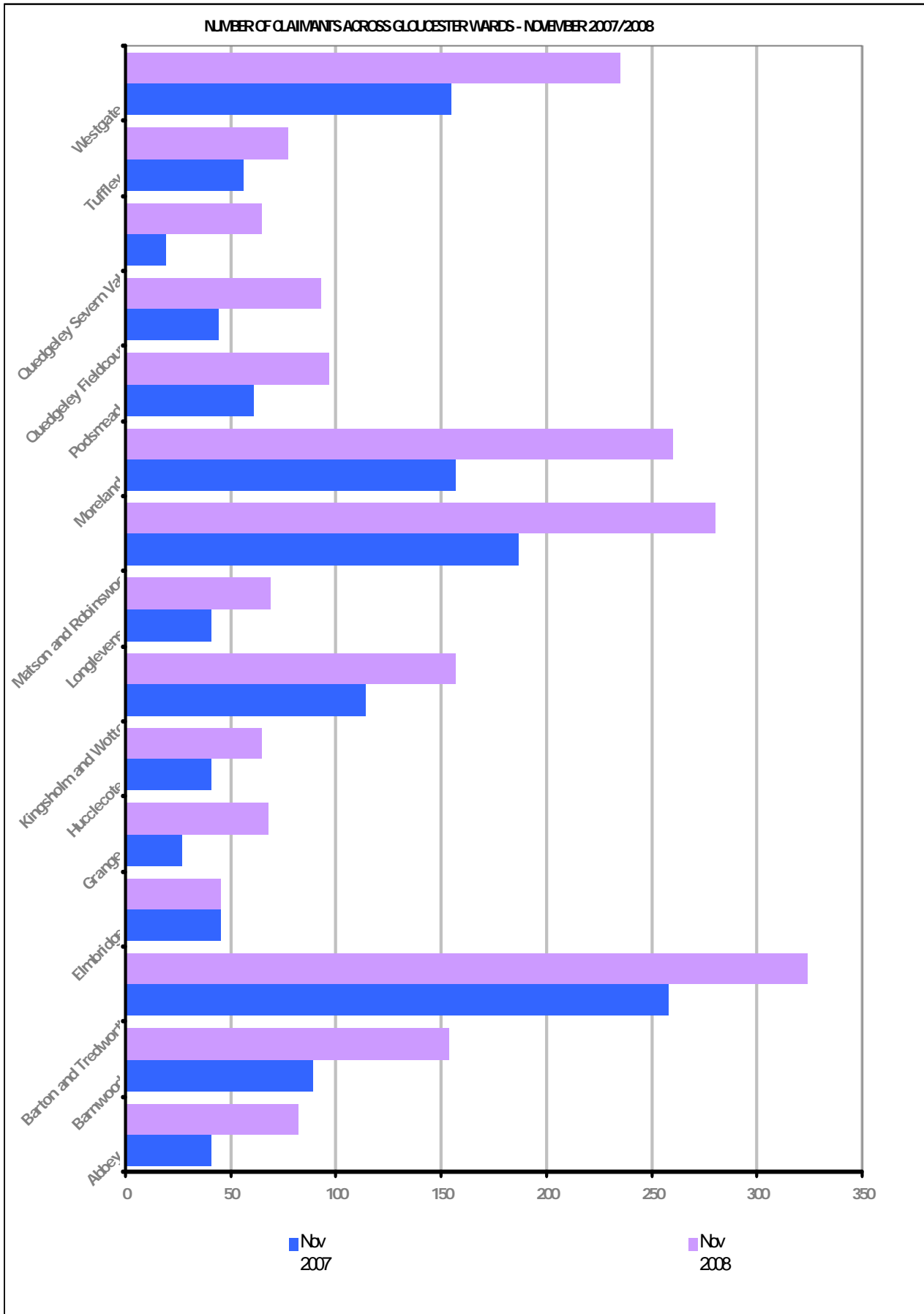

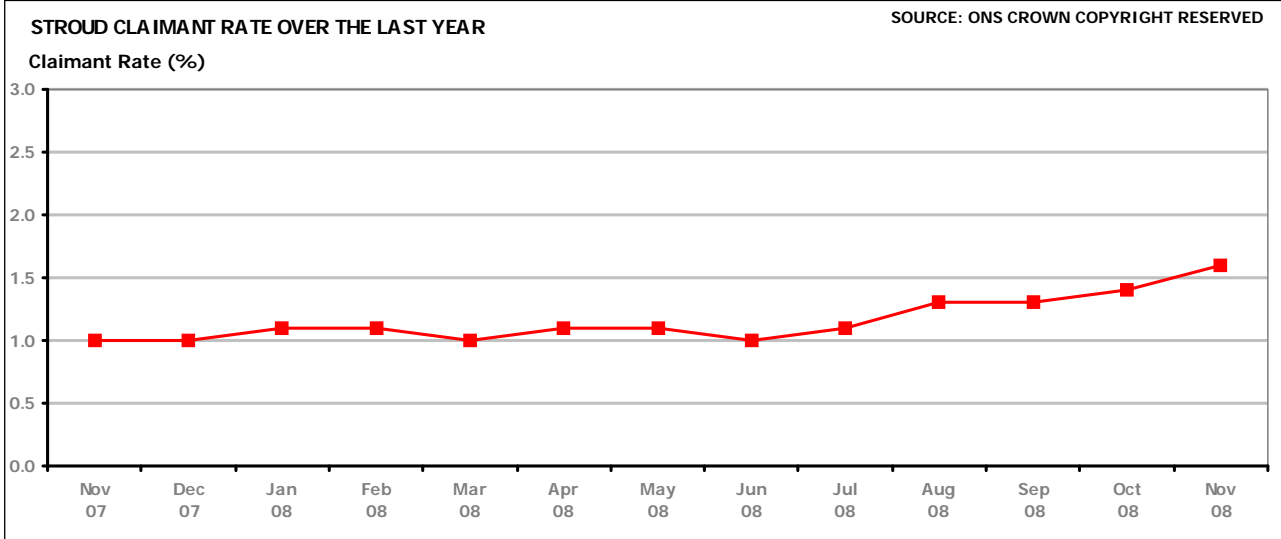


Figure 22 shows the claimant rate for Stroud district was at 1.6% the highest it has been for over two years.

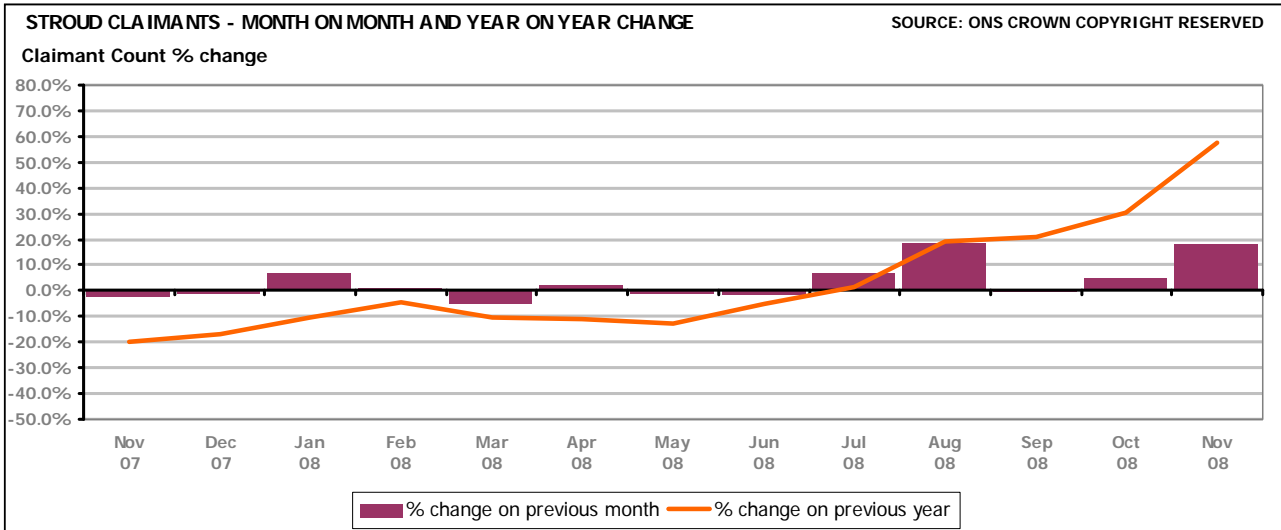

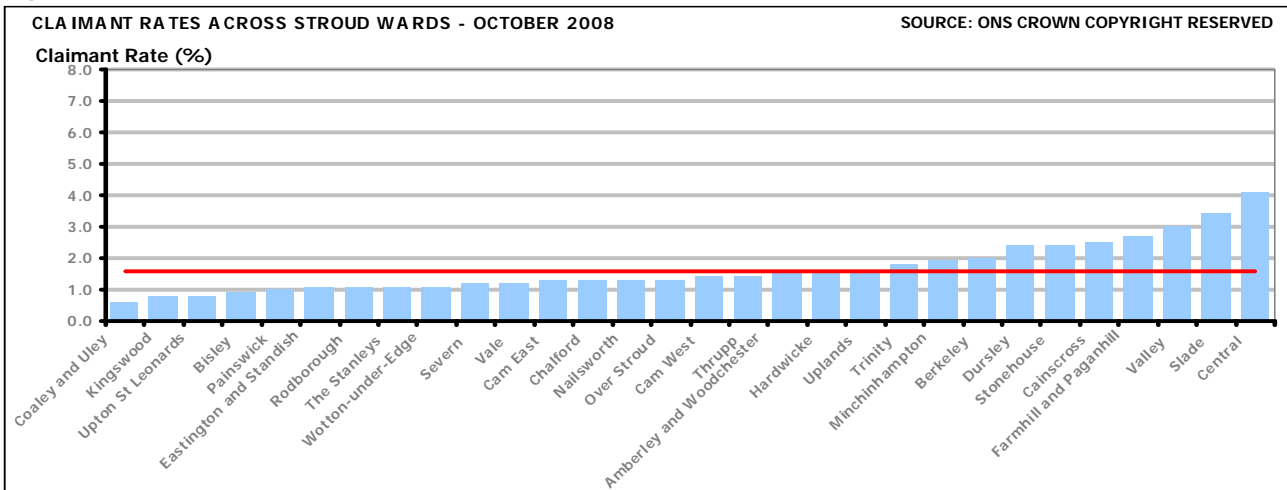


Figure 24 shows the claimant rates in Stroud District wards. The red line represents the average claimant rate across the District and ten of the wards are above the District average.

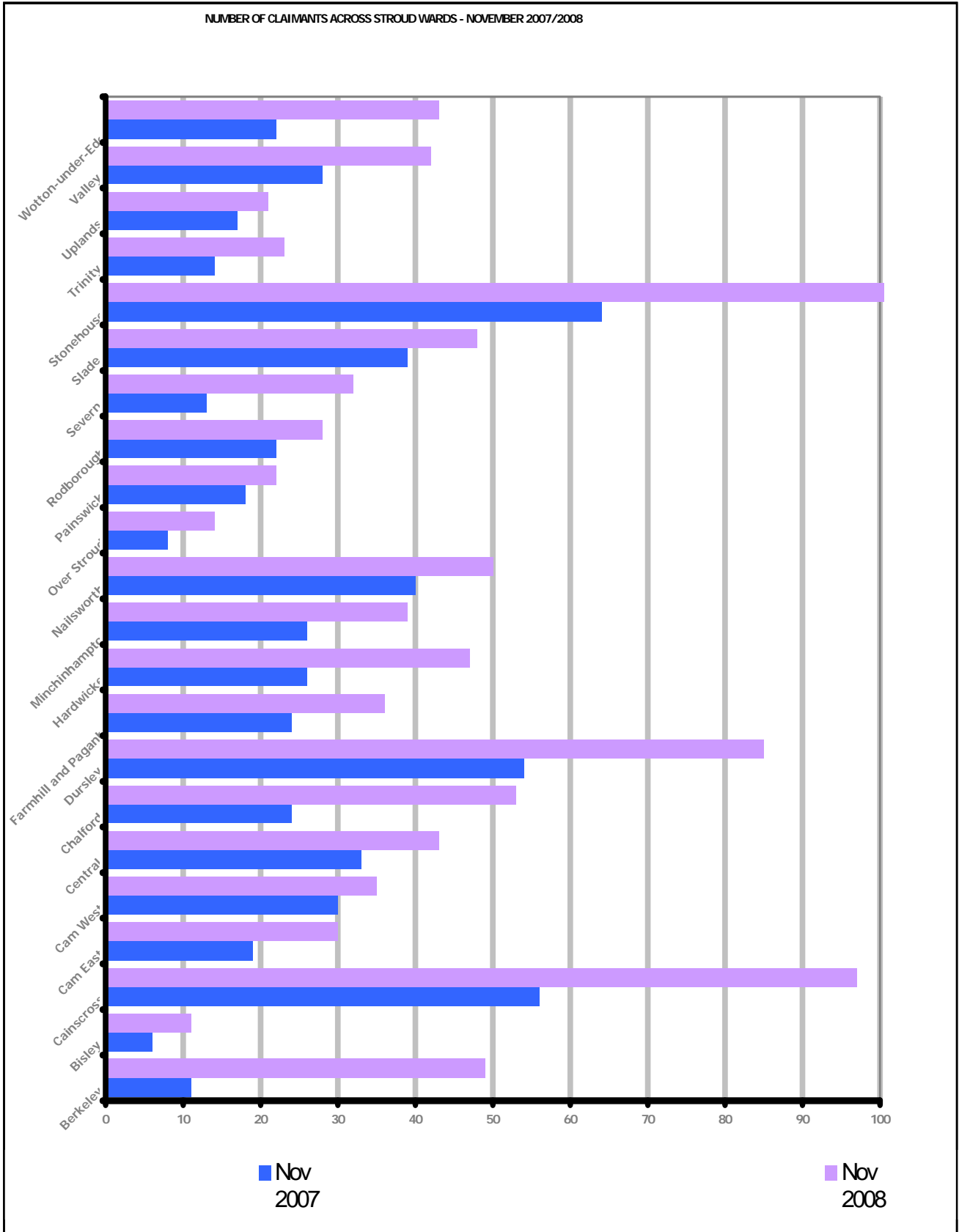

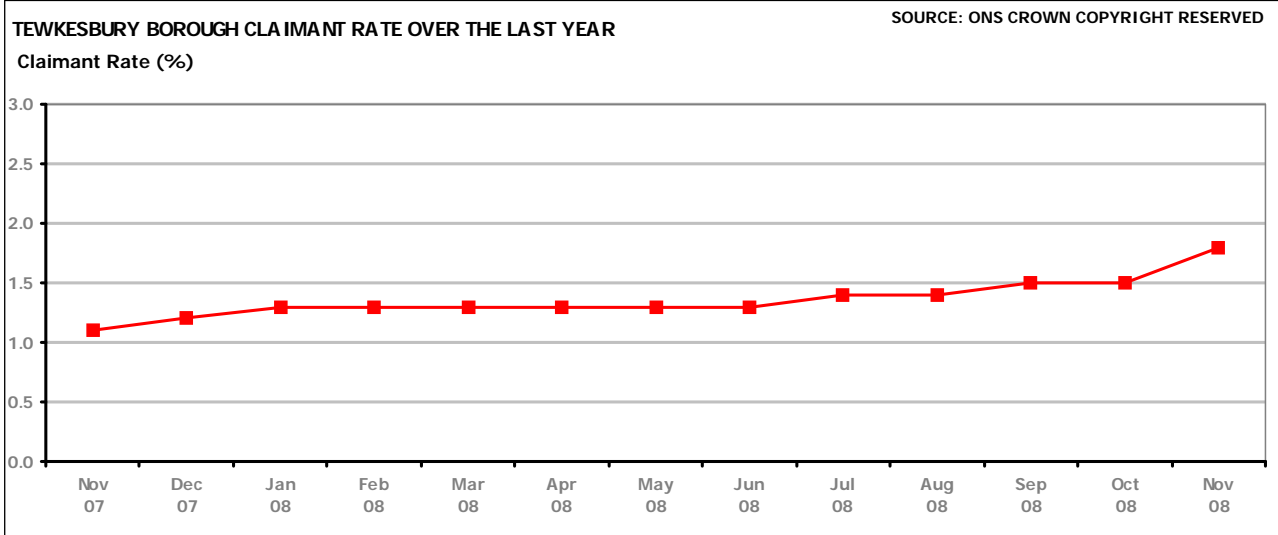


Figure 26 shows the claimant rate for Tewkesbury Borough was at the highest point for the year at 1.8%.

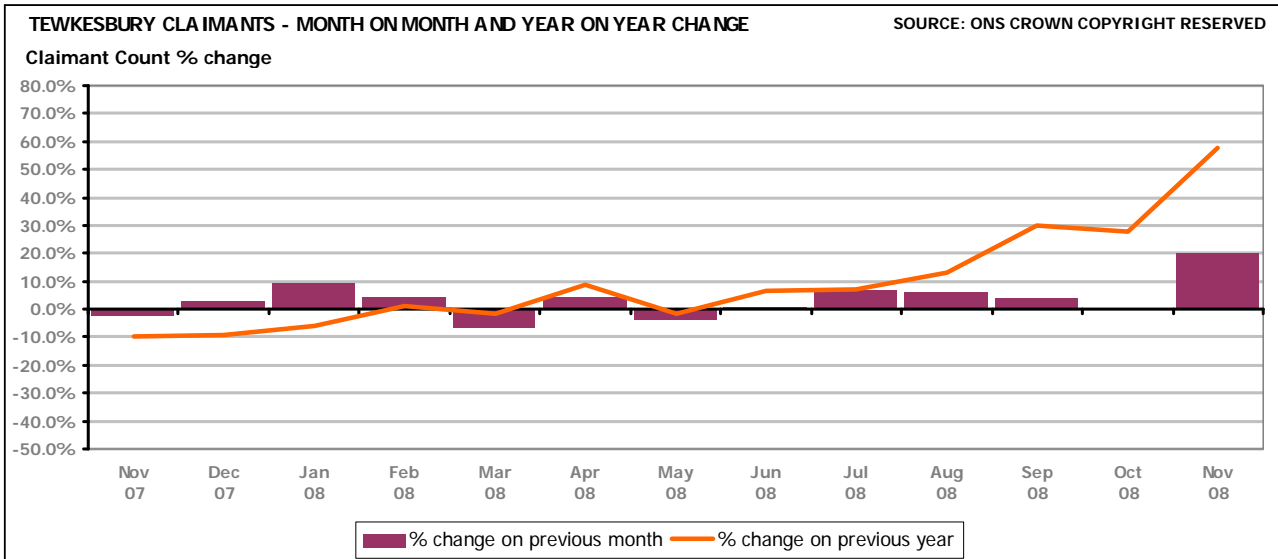


Figure 27 shows that claimant counts have been up every month compared to the same month the previous year since June 2008. The count in November 2008 was 60% higher than it was in October 2008.

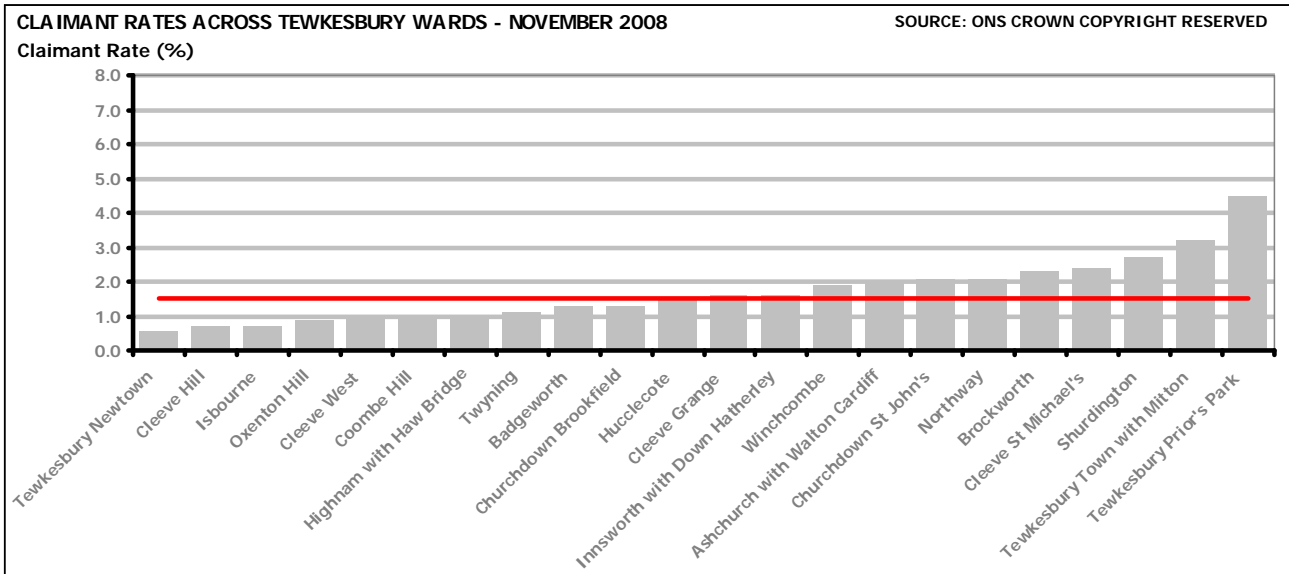

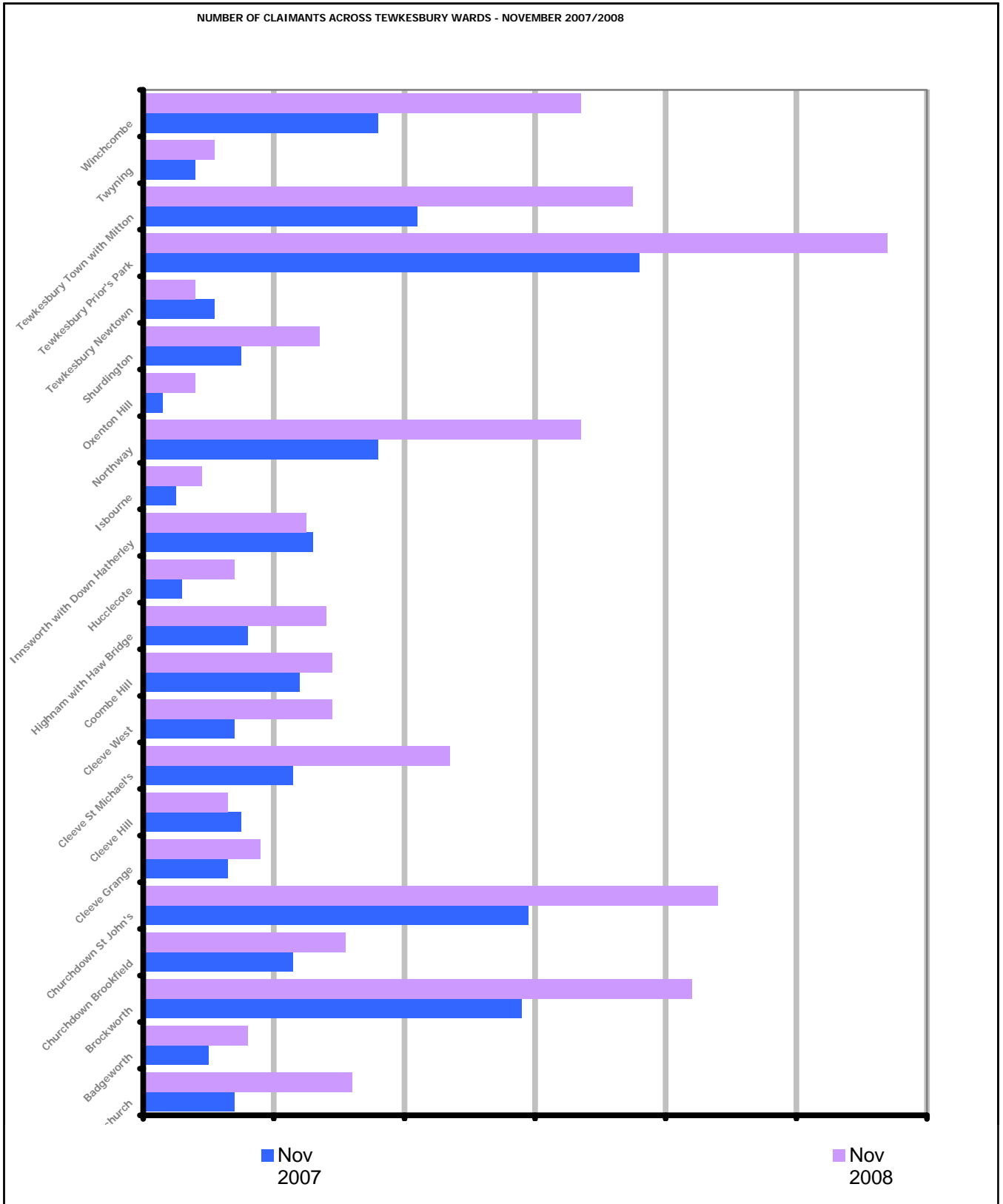

## Part 4: Young People not in education, employment or training (NEET) in Gloucestershire

Connexions Gloucestershire is required to report performance with the 16-18 age range against nationally defined criteria for counting the NEET group. The NEET group includes young people actively seeking education, employment or training as well as those young people who are either not yet ready or who are unable to access these opportunities because of their personal circumstances. The figures quoted below include young people in both of these categories.

### Summary

As at the end of November 2008 there were 693 young people aged 16-18 not in education, employment or training in Gloucestershire. This figure translates into an adjusted (\*) 16-18 NEET population of 3.9%. This has decreased from 4.6% at the end of October 2008 and this very positive performance, given the current economic climate, is the result of a period of enhanced tracking and support for young people from staff within Connexions.

### Analysis of NEET joiners during November 2008 – key findings

Research into young people who joined the NEET group during November 2008 reveals the following information;

- 62% of joiners were male whereas previous research has shown a parity between the sexes
- 35% of joiners live in the Gloucester area
- 46% of joiners were in the 17 year old cohort range
- 18% of joiners already hold a level 2 qualification – an indicator demonstrating the effect of the economic recession
- 35% of the joiners had managed to return to EET (education, employment or training) at the time of the analysis showing the effectiveness of early intervention

We are now working closely with partner agencies to ensure these findings inform future actions to support young people.
