Council Tax 2023/24

The county council has been busy delivering on the ambitions set out in our four-year strategy this time last year.

This includes the opening of the £35 million High School Leckhampton which is already providing a wonderful, enriching environment for the students learning there. By the end of this financial year, we will have invested around £34 million into highways resurfacing schemes, repairing potholes and doing other routine maintenance of the county's roads. We also launched the £550,000 Community Speedwatch Fund and the £1.5 million Levelling Up Fund to help our communities tackle the biggest challenges they are facing.

Our ambition is not wavering for the year ahead. Our spending for 2023/24 will reach £560 million, a rise of more than £40 million on 2022/23 levels. There is also £119 million committed to complete transformative infrastructure projects such as the Gloucester South-West Bypass, Arle Court Transport Hub, the flagship 26-mile cycle spine, and flood alleviation schemes like projects in Nailsworth, Coleford and Pittville town centres.

We also enter the second year of our four-year £100 million commitment to continuously improve Gloucestershire's roads. We have a further £44 million commitment in this budget to go on delivering the best possible educational facilities for children and young people in the county.

Our number one priority is always to protect our most vulnerable and that is why we are also committing a further £22 million to make sure we continue to improve children's services and £24 million to support vulnerable adults and those living with a disability.

All this ambition, of course, needs to be funded. Like most households, we have challenged ourselves on how we can be more efficient to make the money go further for the year ahead and we have already identified £32 million of savings.

The budget proposes raising £13.60 million to help fund services through a council tax increase of 2.99%. We are also proposing to raise £7.37 million specifically to support our work with the most vulnerable adults in the county through a 2% increase in the adult social care precept. These figures take account of an increase in the number of people in the county eligible to pay.

Despite this, we still expect to have one of the lowest council tax levels of any county council. Based on a band D property, this equates to a £6.04 monthly increase.

We know this comes at a time when every household's purse is being squeezed. It is not a decision we have taken lightly, but to go on delivering for every resident in Gloucestershire, it is a necessary one.

This budget is another step towards delivering our strategy to create a greener, healthier and more prosperous Gloucestershire.

Council tax helping to firm-up the front line

When I presented my budget to the county's Police and Crime Panel, I was pleased that a cross-party grouping of experienced councillors and independent members unanimously supported my proposals to strengthen the Constabulary.

I was able to report that we had funded plans to increase the size of the force by over 300 officers, Police Community Support Officers and police staff — most of them already in place, the balance recruited by the autumn. I also plan to recruit around 200 more volunteer Special Constables and 100 Volunteer Police Community Support Officers. We also have over 60 people supporting victims of crime, and youth groups helping to divert youngsters from the possibility of becoming involved in crime.

These increases have been possible due to a combination of sources — extra funding from the Home Office, your hard earned council tax contributions and my team's success in bidding for financial support from a range of Government outlets. Indeed, in securing over £3M from the Safer Streets initiative, we have outperformed most other forces, acquiring money to tackle anti–social behaviour, male violence against women and girls, and rural crime.

The Chief Constable and I continue to work on a new operating model for the Constabulary, based on an assessment of where crime and police demand are coming from – something which has changed substantially in recent years. The force is working hard to improve its understanding and recording of all crime incidents, re–assessing its ability to prevent crimes at source and capacity to cope with 999 calls.

Our force control room, for most the first point of contact with the police, is now performing better, having benefited from substantial investment in extra call handlers and new technology. In January, our average answer time for 999 calls was 9 seconds (one second inside the national target), and 101 non–emergency calls answered in 2 minutes 40 seconds (my target is 2 minutes) – our best figures in 2 years. Still more to do, but we are starting to see significant improvements in effectiveness across the Constabulary, all tangible results of the extra investment from you, the tax payer.
